On a particularly sunny afternoon, Heather N. walks into the Urbandale Food Pantry with her son. It's the beginning of the month and with the holidays right around the corner, she is excited to shop for some items that will fill the table when she hosts Thanksgiving dinner.

"Our family has been coming here for quite a few years but recently we've been here more often. We couldn't make it through the month without this service and we appreciate it so much," Heather said. "Everything has gone up so much. Our property taxes went up \$160/month. This extra food makes all the difference for us."

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT BEST WAYS TO GIVE NOW NEW FACES AT DMARC

MY HOLIDAY WISH

"You can't build a peaceful world on empty stomachs and human misery," - Norman Borlaug

These words feel especially chaotic this holiday season as we enter what will likely be the busiest holiday season in the 47-year history of the DMARC Food Pantry Network. It feels like no time is better than now to highlight the reason why we do this work – the people.

This special issue of *The Voice* features stories from a number of our neighbors and friends who also happen to visit a local food pantry. As we continue to see a record number of people using a DMARC pantry for the first time, more people are facing the stigma that comes with getting assistance. If you are reading this, you are probably well aware of how prevalent food insecurity is right now in the metro (5 of the busiest days ever have come in November... so far) but it's easy to forget that this isn't something you can always see people struggling with.

The people battling this stigma could be your neighbor across the street, your friends, your co-worker a couple of desks over, or even your own family members.

As we navigate this 'new normal' of rising prices in the grocery aisle, DMARC is making every effort to find ways to adapt our network to meet this growing need while making all feel welcome. This past year we have seen some of these changes play out in real time in our own building. October marked the end of a busy first year for the DMARC-Ket Southside Food Pantry.

The DMARC-Ket is the first permanant pantry site



operated by DMARC and has quickly become one of the busiest in the metro.

Since the soft opening in Sept. 2022, the number of individuals being assisted in the Southside Des Moines zip codes (50315, 50320, & 50317) has increased 69%. In its first four weeks, the DMARC-ket assisted over 1,000 people, and one in four visitors had never been assisted by the DMARC Food Pantry Network before. Building more access on the Southside had long been a focus for our organization but no one could've predicted how quickly and how massive this shift would be for our ability to reach more people and this need isn't going anywhere.

Even though we aren't going to end food insecurity overnight, let's find a couple ways this holiday season to start small. My holiday wish this year is simple ... I challenge you to:

- **1. Listen** Hear the stories of people who have the courage to share the hardships they are facing.
- **2. Put yourself in their shoes** what would you do if this was your family member, a member of your congregation, or even yourself?
- **3. Make a plan** Is there something small or couragous you can do in your neck of the woods? Every bit counts and together we can unite to meet this critical need.

INCLUDE GIVING TO DAKE ?



It's that time of year again - the time of year that our mail and e-mail boxes are flooded with appeals from nonprofits all doing important work.

But what's the best way to help?

DMARC accepts a wide variety of gift types, including stocks and with planning, they can not only help DMARC, but they can also help you, and quite often have very positive tax implications. Below are a few of our favorites. As always, we check with your financial advisor to learn what makes the best sense for you.

You can make a stock gift.

Donating long-term appreciated securities such as stock, bonds and mutual funds is easier than you may think. When you donate the stock itself—rather than selling or liquidating the security—you won't need to remove the long-term capital gains taxes paid from the overall sum. To transfer stock, either you or your broker fills out DMARC's form and we do the rest.

Everyone can make in-kind donations!

These include physical items, but they can also include gifts of services, time, or expertise and help DMARC use our financial resources in better ways. A new option is our car donation program. We have also received gifts of grain. As always, you can also donate nonperishable food items directly to DMARC or via our Red Barrel program at area retailers.

You can make a planned gift to DMARC - join the Just One Legacy Society

It can be hard to think about what happens after we're gone, but setting up a planned gift is a great way to ensure that your support to DMARC and our mission to meet basic human needs continues through a Charitable Remainder Trust, Charitable Gift Annuity, Charitable Lead Trust, Life Insurance policy (even a SLIVER can make a huge difference) or through your Qualified Retirement Plan.

Some planned gifts don't have to happen after you're gone – they can be created now, and even provide taxable income during your lifetime.

Gifts of Cash

Gifts of cash allow organizations to do what is needed most when a contribution is made. You can give a gift of cash in a number of ways:

- By making a year-end gift online. Establish a recurring gift to join the 'Apple a Day' Giving Club
- By designating DMARC as your charity of choice through your workplace giving campaign
- By donating your IRA required minimum distribution (for those age 70 and a half)
- By designating a gift to DMARC through your giving fund at the Community Foundation.

Whatever your gift, know that it will be valued and used <u>efficiently and effectively</u> in our community to meet basic human needs in greater Des Moines. **Want to learn more? Connect with me!**

Heather and her husband have five children and seven grandchildren. She is thankful to be able to spend most of her time as a full-time caretaker for her kids and her mother... but the work can be difficult.

With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, business came to a halt for the handyman business that she and her husband operated. He went to work as a forklift operator and she found her time spread even more thin. After her father's unexpected passing in a car accident, her mother came to live with them.

The Urbandale Food Pantry has been a safe haven for her family in navigating life's challenges and the dignified experience of shopping for your own food is a small but important victory.

"When you come in here the people are so friendly. They don't treat you like you are less than, they treat you like they're glad you are here," said Heather. "It takes a lot of courage to ask for help and it takes courage to share your story. It is humbling to say I need your help and I can't do this without you... but that's what I'm saying. I couldn't do it without you."

As the DMARC Food Pantry Network nears the end of what will be the busiest year on record, a staggering 53,000+ people have been assisted so far through the end of September. About 1 in 3 of these individuals are utilizing a DMARC Pantry for the first time. For those like Heather, and new visitors especially, feeling welcome can be the difference in making the trip or not.

As the need grows, so does the frequency

Debra G. pulls up to the Families First – Bidwell Pantry on one of the first bitter cold days of the fall. She is grateful that today is a good day for her health, but getting to the pantry isn't always realistic.

- **Rebeka S.** appreciates the option for mobile and permanent pantries. She's used both as a resource to help handicapped relatives and grab food while being unhoused in the winter months

- **Majed A.** and his wife immigrated to the US 7 1/2 years ago. He wants to work but his career as an electrical engineer isn't feasible anymore with his health. At 65, he is taking classes at DMACC to learn IT skills.

"I've had five major surgeries. I wasn't supposed to take a step in my life. But guess what? By the grace of god I'm walking!"

- **DEBRA G.** is recently retired and lived in DSM for the last 13 years. She and her husband deal with multiple health difficulties including diabetes and severe arthritis. She was born prematurely in the 1960's and wasn't supposed to survive more than a couple weeks.

She has had five major surgeries and her mobility issues were complicated even further by a major car accident in the 1990's. She appreciates the ease of access the DMARC food delivery service provides on days when getting to a pantry is especially difficult.

Debra, like many folks, finds herself visiting a pantry more frequently now after retiring last year.

This increased need is a growing reality for many this year. So far in 2023, 20% of everyone who has utilized a DMARC Pantry has gone more than once a month. Nevertheless, Debra is hopeful for the future and insists that the pantry is an "essential" service in the communities for people like herself.

MEET THE NEWEST DMARC TEAM MEMBERS




WADE JOHNSON - Local Route Driver
